

Corn Growers Set Policy Resolutions for 2016

The Wisconsin Corn Growers Association (WCGA) approved a range of state and federal resolutions for 2016 at the organization's annual meeting held during Corn/Soy Expo. **Read more on Page 3.**

In the area of ethanol market expansion, the corn growers approved a resolution supporting the removal of regulatory barriers on the use of higher blends of ethanol, and supporting state and national efforts by fuel retailers to market 15% ethanol blends.

With uncertainty over the permitting process of high capacity wells caused by a series of court decisions, the corn growers are supporting regulatory changes to streamline the well permit application process and clarify permitting for new or replacement wells.

WCGA members adopted a resolution supporting adequate funding of state and federal transportation budgets. The corn growers also opposed improper application of road damage statutes.

WCGA members approved a resolution supporting a four-year fee holiday on the Agricultural Chemical Cleanup Program (ACCP) because of its existing balance and to prevent the state from raiding this fund for use in other state budget areas.

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Growers Make Voice Heard in Washington

Eight WCGA members met with the state's congressional delegation in Washington, DC, March 13-16. The members also met with federal agency leaders, foreign embassy staff, lobbying groups and ethanol organizations. The corn growers advocated adoption of the Trans Pacific Partnership (TPP) agreement and support for uniform national labeling of foods produced using GMO technology. The group also continued making the case for protection of the Renewable Fuel Standard.

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Updates to Implements of Husbandry Law Proposed

The third version of Wisconsin's Implements of Husbandry bill was recently signed by Gov. Scott Walker. The bill's authors, Sen. Jerry Petrowski (R-Marathon) and Rep. Keith Ripp (R-Lodi), say their latest revisions address items that are technical in nature but still critically important to farmers operating machinery on state roadways.



Major changes of the bill include:

- 1. Clarified that an implement dealer must disclose the axle weight(s) and gross vehicle weight of an implement upon sale. The disclosure must be in writing and that the 'unladen' vehicle weight be disclosed at the point of sale.
- 2. Changed references in statutes of "from farm to field, from field to field or from farm to farm" or "to or from a farm-related destination" to capture the movement between or among farms, fields, agricultural storage or processing facilities, and locations where an IOH or Ag-CMV is stored.



- 3. Changed the statutes governing the definition and use of the slow moving vehicle (SMV) sign. The changes reflect the true purpose of the SMV sign—to indicate the slow moving speed of a vehicle and nothing else.
 - An IOH must have an SMV sign, but it isn't used to indicate the presence of a 'wide' IOH.
 - An SMV sign will no longer be used as a marking instrument for the side of a vehicle in an agricultural train consisting of two implements of husbandry drawn by a motor truck, truck tractor or agricultural commercial motor vehicle.
 - An operator will no longer be allowed to attach a yellow of amber light to the left rear of an IOH as a marking instrument in lieu of an SMV sign.
- 4. Federal law does not authorize an Ag-CMV that exceeds 8.5 feet in width to be operated on the interstate highway system unless it has an oversize permit from Wisconsin Department of Transportation. This was understood, but it will now be expressly written out in statutes.
- 5. For the movement of IOH within a 75-mile radius from an implement dealer to a farmer or vice versa, this bill clarifies statutes with regard to the operation, towing or transport of IOH being transported and facing to the rear. It requires that amber flashers must be activated to mark the lateral extremities of the transported IOH. It also stipulates that an IOH being operated or towed can legally be on the interstate highway system, but any IOH being transported that exceeds 8.5 feet in width must have an oversize permit from DOT.
- 6. Clarified that if someone is transporting an IOH that exceeds 8.5 feet in width at times other than hours of darkness, they must have amber flashers activated to mark the lateral extremities of the IOH.
- 7. Allowed an applicant for a no fee permit to submit only one application for multiple IOH or Ag-CMVs if those vehicles listed in the application are identical.

The organization said in a letter to Kate VandenBosch, Dean of CALS, the research through this position has provided Wisconsin corn growers valuable information on weed management, helping growers increase corn yields and the value of the corn crop to Wisconsin's economy. The Weed Specialist position has been unfilled for several years. WCGA said it recognized the budget restraints faced by the University of Wisconsin System, but expressed its support for funding research through this position to help growers increase productivity and profits through weed management.

WCGA State and Federal Priority Resolutions Adopted At Annual Meeting

- 1. Renewable Fuels in Wisconsin: Support removal of regulatory barriers on the use of higher blends of ethanol. Support national efforts to use 15% ethanol blends and the continued promotion of E-85. Support the Renewable Fuel Standard (RFS) for biofuels and support the statutory Renewable Volume Obligations of RFS2.
- **2. Waters of the United States:** Oppose the EPA's definition of the Waters of the United States (WOTUS).
- **3. High Capacity Wells:** Support regulatory certainty on the permitting of new or replacement wells. Support streamlining the permit application process so that applications are processed within 60 days.
- **4. Soil Conservation:** Encourage farmers to follow conservation plans to improve soil stewardship.
- **5. Responsible Nutrient Management:** Support the intent of current nonpoint pollution regulations and urge that enforcement and rules be based on common sense approach to maintain and increase Wisconsin's livestock sector.
- **6. Transportation:** Support adequate funding of state and federal transportation budgets. Oppose charging


- farmers for using, maintaining and upgrading local roads not designed or maintained for modern agricultural equipment. Oppose improper application of road damage statues. Support reasonable Implements of Husbandry rules. Support improving and replacing parts of the aging Mississippi River lock and dam system.
- Agricultural Chemical Cleanup Program and Agrichemical Management Program Funds: Support discontinuing the ACCP and ACM funds, fees and taxes. Support a fouryear fee holiday.
- **8. Fertilizer Research:** Support a separate and expanded fund for fertilizer research.
- **9. Use Value Assessment of Farmland:** Support efforts to protect use value assessment of agricultural lands.
- **10. Atrazine:** Support releasing prohibited areas based on sound science.
- **11. Market Development:** Support efforts to maintain or increase funding of the Foreign Market Development and Market Access Programs through efforts of the U.S. Grains Council.

Roundabout Bills to Help Trucks, Farm Machinery

Senate Bill 379 and Assembly Bill 451 will allow large vehicles within a multi-lane roundabout to deviate from the lane in which they are traveling to safely navigate the roundabout. Deviations must be done with due regard for all other traffic. The bills would require smaller vehicles to yield to larger farm machinery and trucks.

The bills define a large vehicle as a vehicle or a combination of vehicles with a total length of 40 feet or more or a total width of 10 feet or more. Vehicles that don't meet those specifications must yield the right-of-way when approaching or driving through a roundabout, and, if necessary, shall reduce speed or stop in order to yield.

SB 379 was authored by State Senator Howard Marklein (R-Spring Green). AB 451 was authored by State Rep. Ed Brooks (R-Reedsburg).



Governor Signs Weigh Exemption and Manure Piping Bills

Gov. Scott Walker signed a package of ag bills on March 1 addressing weight exemption dates and allowing manure piping.

Senate Bill 509, authored by State Senator Jerry Petrowski (R-Marathon), changes the start date for the weight exemption from September 1 to August 1. This allows farmers additional time to operate at increased weight limits during the fall harvest.

Certain agricultural vehicles are now allowed to exceed weight limits, without a permit, by 15 percent between August 1 and December 31 of each year. Commonly referred to as the 'fall harvest exemption,' it allows farmers to transport larger loads of harvested crops from the field to the farm or storage facilities during crucial harvest times.

Senate Bill 390, authored by State Senator Jerry Petrowski (R-Marathon) and State Rep. James Edming (R-Glen Flora) would give clear authority for local municipalities to permit the piping of liquid manure within a highway right-of-way.
